MESSAGE FROM OUR CEO, MIKE WESTERDALE

Welcome to the autumn edition of our Trust newsletter showcasing the very positive start to the academic year and a celebration of the successes at all our academies. Bursting at the seams with stories of pupil and student achievements, exciting enrichment experiences, competitions, and engaging classroom activities, enjoy reading all about the first half term at Brigantia Learning Trust.

First and foremost, I must congratulate our secondary academies on their excellent examination results. At Hinde House, performance shows growth and success and has once again proved the academy's commitment to delivering excellence in everything they do, with increases on all headline measures since 2019. Yewlands celebrated a stunning array of subject performance increases and individual successes, with overall student progress improving on last year's figures. Many of our former Year 11 students have now taken up their places at our partner academy Longley Park, for their next chapter.

At Longley Park, we celebrated a strong pass rate of 96% and elated students accepted places at prestigious and first-choice universities, with 255 students attending higher education institutions including Russell Group universities and others securing competitive apprenticeships and employment opportunities. We hope to welcome them back as part of our alumni network in the near future.

Achievements and successes at Brigantia Learning Trust have been coming through thick and fast, and not only limited to examination results. Our student experience is far reaching, extending beyond the classroom to provide pupils and students across the Trust with opportunities to grow and develop in every way possible, within our culture of care. Similarly, staff benefit from an array of personal and professional development opportunities to enhance their teaching and working experience.

This term, we warmly welcomed prospective pupils and families to our secondary and sixth-form academies to experience what life is like at our academies and Trust, and it was a pleasure to read so much positive feedback. 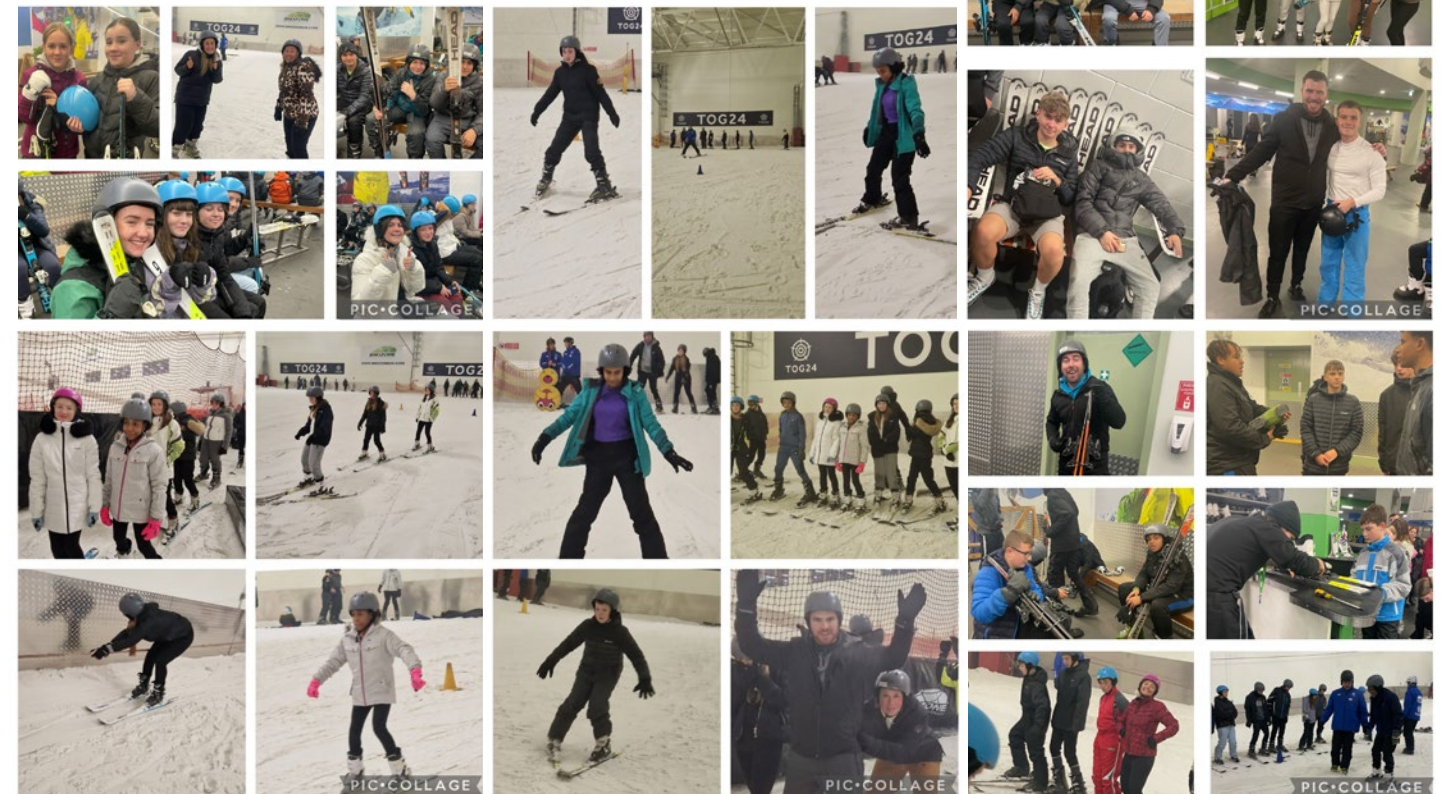

Correspondence with the King

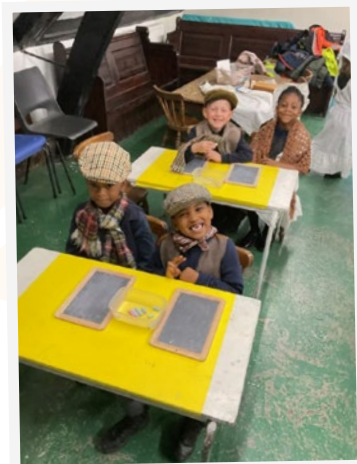

A Step Back in Time

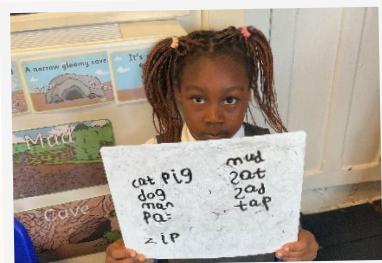
As part of our pupils' class topic Victorian Schools, KS1 children were lucky enough to visit Wincobank Chapel which was the first Victorian school set up in the area run by Mary Anne Rawson, abolitionist, campaigner and founder of the Sheffield Female Anti-Slavery Society. The visit aimed to showcase what life was like in Victorian schools, and just like Victorian times, children were expected to do exactly as they were told by Miss Read, making sure to follow all instructions. It was clear that nobody wanted to wear the dunce hat!

Pupils took home interesting lessons, including what a typical school day was like in Victorian times, writing on slate boards using chalk. They also had the opportunity to look at lots of Victorian artefacts and even dressed up in Victorian clothing. It was a fantastic trip which proved to complement learning and provide pupils with a unique insight, back in time.



Settling In

Starting school for the first time can be an exciting but daunting prospect for pupils and their parents, and we are thrilled that Reception children have settled well into life at the academy. This term, they have enjoyed their learning activities, particularly our Write Dance activities which serves to link their gross motor movements to the fine motor. Our class topics have focused on the seasons and learning about ourselves in which pupils created models of themselves, and they have made excellent progress learning their phonics sounds and focusing on putting them together to blend into words.



Basketball Success

Year 4 pupils represented Concord Junior Academy in a recent basketball fixture and were a credit to the academy. Competing against three other schools in games hosted by Hinde House Secondary, Concord narrowly missed out on moving through to the next stage of the competition, despite excellent game play. Taqwa and Mustafa were selected as stand out players for the academy for their exceptional displays of commitment and effort, and we are incredibly proud of all players for showing great teamwork, determination and fair play.



We're Going on a Minibeast Hunt

As part of science learning last half term, KS2 pupils went outside to take part in a minibeast hunt. Pupils enjoyed searching for and naming a variety of minibeasts using a range of identification keys, spending time exploring the school grounds and the large area of banking next to our school yard, which is home to a large range of different habitats. Learning outside the classroom is a valuable aspect of our pupil experience and allows pupils to apply their new found knowledge in new contexts.



Concord Lights Up the Hill

Before the end of term, pupils in Years 3 and 4 were introduced to, and participated in, the Light Up the Hill Lantern Procession. In preparation for the occasion, all pupils had the opportunity to make their very own lanterns from scratch, using willow wood and paper. Learning new skills, pupils manipulated the willow into the shape of a lantern, and then covered it using paper and glue, before placing lights inside to make them light up. The children were successful in making working lanterns and were very pleased that they could take their very own lantern to the procession!



Strike for Concord!

At the start of October, pupils across Years 4-6 represented their academy with pride as they took part in a ten-pin bowling competition. They competed against many schools across the Sheffield area and at the end of the event, all children were awarded with a certificate and medal for their participation. It was a fantastic event, and the children all had a brilliant afternoon.





PRIMARY PHASE

A Visit to Kelham Island

Year 6 embarked on an exciting visit to the local museum at Kelham Island, to support their learning of why Sheffield is known as the Steel City. Before the visit, pupils researched all about the Industrial Revolution, its impact on the city and some of the trailblazers of Sheffield who were involved in the key developments. On the trip, pupils learnt more about Crucible Steel, Bessemer Convertors and much more, before investigating how the changes impacted people in the past, and longer-term impacts for us today. Our Year 6 pupils are looking forward to taking their local learning further next half term as we discover how geographical factors also impacted on historical developments in our wonderful Steel City!



Super Science

At Hinde House Primary we are incredibly fortunate to be able to utilise our linked secondary academy facilities to enhance learning. This term, Year 5 and 6 pupils have visited the secondary phase for some of their science lessons, taking place in the dedicated laboratories. All of the pupils thoroughly enjoyed learning in the new environment – Year 6 even completed a heart dissection to introduce them to their topic on the circulatory system!



Budding Geographers

Year 1 and 2 pupils had an exciting opportunity to apply their learning to a new environment as part of their Geography topic. Pupils explored beyond the classroom and visited the local area to identify key geographical features. It was fantastic to see pupils utilising their new map reading skills to locate where they were and spot landmarks and admire spectacular views from the top of Wincobank Hill.



A Visit From the Tooth Fairy

There was a surprise visitor to Reception Class this term – the tooth fairy! Second Year Hygiene and Therapy Student Katie Oxley is studying at the University of Sheffield, and we warmly welcomed her to our academy to work in partnership with Hinde House Primary teachers to establish toothbrushing club, an initiative we have since implemented every Friday. We are thrilled that the pupils are loving it, as we understand the importance of sustaining good oral hygiene from a young age, and how these can impact on the rest of their lives.
