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Future Ready

In March, more than 15 employers from some of Sheffield's largest companies gave up their time in support of our students and their career aspirations by participating in a speed networking event.

Tim Lyddiatt, LPSF Futures Manager and organiser of the event, said: "The aim of the event was to start breaking down barriers to employment by enabling students to speak with multiple employers in a safe, supportive environment. These students are not long at Longley Park and, when they leave us, they are going to need to know how to speak to employers, adapt to changing environments and be confident in presenting themselves. This event was the start of them realising not only that but that they can do it too. I'm really pleased with how it went."

Along with the speed networking element, many of our volunteers shared their own career paths with students, revealing that very few of them planned to be where they are now or even knew that their current roles existed. Tim added: "Careers are not about making single, straight-line steps that that can be seen well before we need to take them. Career journeys are formed from dynamic steps that are taken because we have made decisions based on our circumstances now, and how they can positively impact our future."

This event marked the start of **Progression Season** which culminated with a series of events in April all designed to demystify work, workplaces and employment. We were thrilled that more than 40 organisations have signed up to support those and are incredibly grateful to all who have participated in our events, helping our students to realise their career ambitions.



Step into Science

The spring term has been packed with exciting enrichment opportunities across our Science department, giving students valuable experiences beyond the classroom.

Our Level 2 learners had a successful visit to the Get up to Speed with STEM fair at MAGNA, where they explored cutting-edge developments and careers in science, technology, and engineering. For our A Level Physics students, a visit to Sheffield Hallam University provided the chance to complete required practical assessments using the university's state-of-the-art physics workshops – a brilliant opportunity to enhance both skills and confidence.

To kick start the summer term, all 120 Level 3 Applied Science students visited Sheffield Hallam to complete an ester synthesis practical, and our A Level Chemists will visit the university's Chemical Engineering Department for a hands-on insight into applied chemistry at degree level. It's been a fantastic term for enrichment, and we're proud to continue offering experiences that inspire, challenge and support progression.

Where Next?

First year Level 3 Extended Diploma Health and Social Care students visited Sheffield Hallam University (SHU) for a taster day last term and discovered the wide range of courses available in Health. Students were introduced to a variety of degree courses including Nursing, ODP and Radiography and really enjoyed different interactive sessions too. One was in SHU's state-of-the-art simulated hospital ward where they met their 'patients', a second was a 'fake injuries' session where students observed a demonstration and designed their own 'bruises' and lastly engaging in a VR activity which promoted excellent communication skills, vital for working in health and social care.

Meanwhile, Business students visited University Centre Rotherham that included an advice and guidance workshop, a tour of facilities, as well as interactive workshops on Human Computer Interface Design, and Cyber Security. Students were exemplary throughout and engaged well with staff at UCR.
